ON MAY 8th, 1934, Mrs. C.F.Cheaney, a prominent member of the Land Colony, sent invitations to the 55 women at that time residents of the colony to attend a meeting to make plans for a Colony women's club. (see above)

Election of officers was held at a special meeting on May 18th as listed above.

The name chosen was Land Owner's Social Club. That name was later changed to The Sunrise Social Club and in 1937 became EASTSIDE SOCIAL CLUB. The monthly meetings were first held in the old Stanford clubhouse, or former bunkhouse for the Stanford grant employees. The Water Co. had charge of the clubhouse and rented a room to the colony ladies. The members then donated time and money toward fixing up the room. Penny drills were held. From this serving trays and dishes were purchased and are still in use. The first drill of a penny apiece brought 22¢. Money was scarce in those days. All the Colonists were hard pressed, having just bought land, cattle, stock, machinery, etc. to improve their land and to build homes.

The club meetings were for social enjoyment and also for educational benefit. Many interesting programs on gardening, handicrafts, travel,

highway safety and history were presented, plus musical programs and book reviews. The club also took part in community participation for child welfare, hospital volunteers, picnic booths, Fire Department donations, aid to needy families.

During the war years 1944-1947, special meetings were held each month for Red Cross sewing: 14 quilts were made, socks and sweaters for boys overseas, diaper and baby gowns for wives of servicemen. Also 12 prs of hospital slippers, 50 arm slings, 6 bed sacks, 2 kimonos and

In 1949, 31 members earned \$75 for 1st place in decorated cars. In following years they held flower shows, started Secret Pals, and adopted 12 men in the "Old Mans Ward" of the county hospital. In more recent years the club has met at each member's home and frequently played bingo, proceeds of which went to local donations. The "Penny Can" enabled them
