

I am concerned about the proposed plans for the Durham-Oroville Highway bridge over Butte Creek.

I understand the plan is for a simple 32 ft. readway. Due to pedestrian traffic this is inadequate, in view of wide equipment which is used frequently on this readway. Considering wide mirror hangers on trucks and everhang on farm machinery, pedestrians must have the benefit of a raised segregated walkway or a berm of adequate width and height to provide the necessary clearance for their safety.

Dear Mrs. Pearce:

I want to thank the Eastside Social Club for their interest in community problems such as the bridge on the Durham-Oroville Highway.

At the present time we have a 19 foot bridge which engineers tell me is no longer safe. The new bridge will be 32 feet which would seem to offer much more safety than we have at the present time. It took me three years to get this bridge approved in the budget, and if the plans are changed now I am told it could not be built this year as all plans and specifications must be approved by the state, after it is reengineered. Also the bridge design people tell me it would cost approximately \$27,400 for the additional work. Therefore, because I do not want to take the chance some other emergency would get priority and we would not get the bridge, I have agreement from the Board and Public Works Director as follows:

- 1. We will go ahead with construction of the bridge this year.
- A double row of raised reflectors will be put down the center of the bridge along with signs to prevent passing on the bridge.
- A five foot walkway will be painted on the south side of the bridge and a double row of reflectors will be placed to indicate a walkway.
- 4. The Board agrees it would be their intent if the proposed walkway is unsatisfactory in the future to add a separate walkway. (Engineers tell me this could be done later at a slightly higher cost.)

I am informed by the engineers that the raised walkway suggested by several would not be approved by the state.

I would also point out the proposed bridge will be wider than the paved surface of the road approaching the bridge from each direction.

While I am not completely satisfied with these plans it is the best I could do under the circumstances and hope that you will understand.

Thank you again for your interest. I hope this compromise works out in a satisfactory manner. Please feel free to contact me at any time.

Junior Members Are Guests Of Durham Woman's Club

DURHAM (E-R) — Durham Woman's Club had as its special guests members of the Durham. Junior Women's Club at its March 13 meeting in Memorial Hall.

The Juniors were hosted to a potluck dinner and heard a special guest speaker, Mrs. Betty Thompson of Sinai, state scholarship and education chairmam, California Federation of Women's Clubs

Mrs. Thompson's theme was "Yours, Mine, Ours," and spoke of the educational problems being felt by all school districts in California. She noted that one of the main problems is finance and the inequality of education provided students from rich districts as compared to poorer districts. In many areas, teachers have 35 students in a class at the elementary school level, making it difficult to teach the fundamentals of reading so important to progress in all areas of learning.

She noted three areas that parents can help. First, in understanding the problems of their own areas. By assessing their schools, knowing the teachers, board members, and seeing their problems parents can determine what areas need help. Second, by encouraging programs in the schools such as venereal disease and drug education. Third, by helping the schools in areas as tutoring or teacher aides.

She finished her talk by noting that "you are never too old to learn." She used as an example, senior citizens living on a fixed income and trying to cope with the rise in living costs. Classes for these people are needed to help them learn how to live on their income successfully. She encouraged going back to school, even if just pleasure classes as painting or photography. "Listen to the young people," she noted. "They are your kids, our kids, our future."

Also on the agenda for entertainment was the Durham High School chorus under the direction of Margie Schuler. The group presented three numbers, "Hi Ho," "Going Out of my Head," and "You'll Never Walk Alone."

The business meeting was opened by Mrs. Bernice Abshier, president of the Durham Woman's Club, followed by an inspiration by Mrs. Albertine Cain. It was announced that a total of \$725 had been received to this date for the Durham Volunteer Fire Department from the Mexican dinner jointly sponsored by the two groups. Reporting on the activities of the Durham Junior Women's Club during the last year was Mrs. Norlie



"Durham Adobe Church", built of adobe bricks made from Durham soil by Durham people (1939-1941), stands at the site designated for a church by William Durham in the original 1896 town map. The Adobe Church has been a source of community pride and a favorite subject for artists and photographers, as was the original church (1899-1939).

Through the combined efforts of the Butte College Horticulture Department we were offered a beautiful master plan for beautifying the grounds of our California mission-style church, which included a complete sprinkling system which could be installed as a class project at the unbelievable price of \$2500. This was less than half the estimated value of such an installation, however, there was one catch—the job would have to be completed before the Durham campus moved.

As we did not have the ready cash -- yet time was of the essence, the action we should take on this offer became a matter for serious consideration and prayer. We were aware that beautified community parks and buildings benefit all property owners, and finally decided it was a prudent move to accept this "now or never" offer from Butte College to beautify this historic Durham landmark.

We sincerely appreciate the fine work of the students and faculty who installed the system. Willing hands and generous hearts from our church and the Durham community have continued the beautification project. Concrete mow strips were installed; front lawn areas were leveled and planted. Blighted walnut trees were replaced with colorful crepe myrtle; shrubs and ground covers have been added. delighted with the many favorable comments we have received from community people regarding the fine results.

Our only concern is that we are \$1405.27 short in meeting the out of pocket expenses.
